## **GREEN JUNE BEETLE**

COLEOPTERA: SCARABAEIDAE

Cotinis nitida

**Did you know?** Larvae of the green June beetle crawl on their backs when they're moving aboveground!

**Did you know?** Adult green June beetles eat soft-skinned, ripe, or overripe fruit! If you want to catch some, you can peel and put out an old banana in the summer and check it the next day—no guarantees, but you might get them!

**Did you know?** The <u>larvae</u> move very quickly underground! They're considered faster than any other scarab beetle in the USA.
